Recapping Last Month (January 2023)



EDGAR - PURPOSE



- Emphasizes internal controls to strengthen oversight over federal funds to reduce risks of waste, fraud, and abuse.
- Auditors will look for significant written policies and procedures that provide for effective internal controls and will ensure grantees are monitoring employees for compliance with the written policies and procedures.
- Grantees must have written procedures for determining the allowability of costs charged to federal grants. (200.302(b)(7))
- All costs must be documented as reasonable, necessary, allocable, and allowable.

Tips & Tricks Time: Maintenance of Effort(MOE): Special Ed. vs. Federal Programs



Special Education MOE

- What LEAs spend from their general funds, to support and sustain Special Education.
- LEAs must spend at 100% or more of what was spent the prior year, on a per-student basis (uses prior-year childcount), or in aggregate.
- LEAs report MOE expenditures in their <u>IDEA Part B</u> Application for funding to determine MOE compliance and for MOE eligibility (budget). If the LEA fails both tests, the aggregate spending and the per-student-basis is less than 100% of the prior year's spending, LEAs will not qualify for funding until they meet the requirement.
- An audit is performed by the IDEA Fiscal Coordinator.
- LEAs have specific scenarios and restrictions for requesting an exception to MOE. There is no historical requirement or annual restriction on how often an LEA may request the exception. 34 CFR §300.204.

Federal Programs MOE

- An LEA must demonstrate that the level of State and local funding remains constant from year to year, regardless of Federal funding.
- LEAs must spend at least 90% of what was spent the prior year, on a per-student basis, or in aggregate.
- Only if the LEA fails both tests the aggregate spending and the per-student-spending is less than 90% of the prior year's spending - federal allocations will be reduced by the appropriate percentage.
- MOE calculation for ESSA Programs is performed by the State Department of Education (SDE).
- SDE may grant a waiver if the LEA has met MOE in the five immediately preceding fiscal years. ESSA section 8521(b)(1).

MOE: What years are compared? A preceding fiscal year is compared to the second preceding fiscal year. The preceding fiscal year is a full 12- month period prior to the beginning of the current state fiscal year.

Is Food Allowable or Unallowable?



STEP 1: Determine if the food-related expense qualifies as a legitimate business expense (i.e. appropriate and necessary to carry out THE SCOPE OF WORK).

- If not, STOP. The food-related expense is not allowable
- If YES, go to Step 2



STEP 2: Is the food purchase essential to accomplish the scope of work supported by the federal award?

- If No, DO NOT charge this expense to the federal award, instead charge it to an unrestricted fund source
- If YES, are the expenses allowable, allocable and reasonable in accordance with the UGG, other governing regulations / policies for the grant as well as specific policies applicable to the grant?

Reach out to your State grant coordinator to double check!

Title I-C Migrant: There is a statutory requirement that all LEAs that receive migrant funds have a Parent Advisory Council, at a time that is convenient for the parents. Since this is usually in the evening "extending through mealtime," we do allow LEAs to provide supports to encourage parents/families to participate (e.g. food, childcare, transportation). (Chapter VII, Question C7 of Non-Regulatory Guidance).

Legislation & Guidance



Congress Passes \$1.7 Trillion Spending Bill Following weeks of challenging negotiations at the end of 2022, Congress passed a final spending bill late last month that provides funding for fiscal year (FY) 2023. After extending the short-term continuing resolution the federal government had been operating under since September by one week, until December 23, due to slow negotiations, lawmaker's were able to reach an agreement on an omnibus bill that includes funding for all federal agencies before adjourning for the remainder of 2022.

Federal Funding Insights



The FY 2023 spending bill provides \$79.2 billion for the U.S. Department of Education—an increase of approximately \$4 billion from FY 2022. Most education programs received a *five to ten percent boost in funding compared to the prior year*, with Title I grants under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), the minimum Pell Grant amount, and State grants under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) seeing the largest increases.

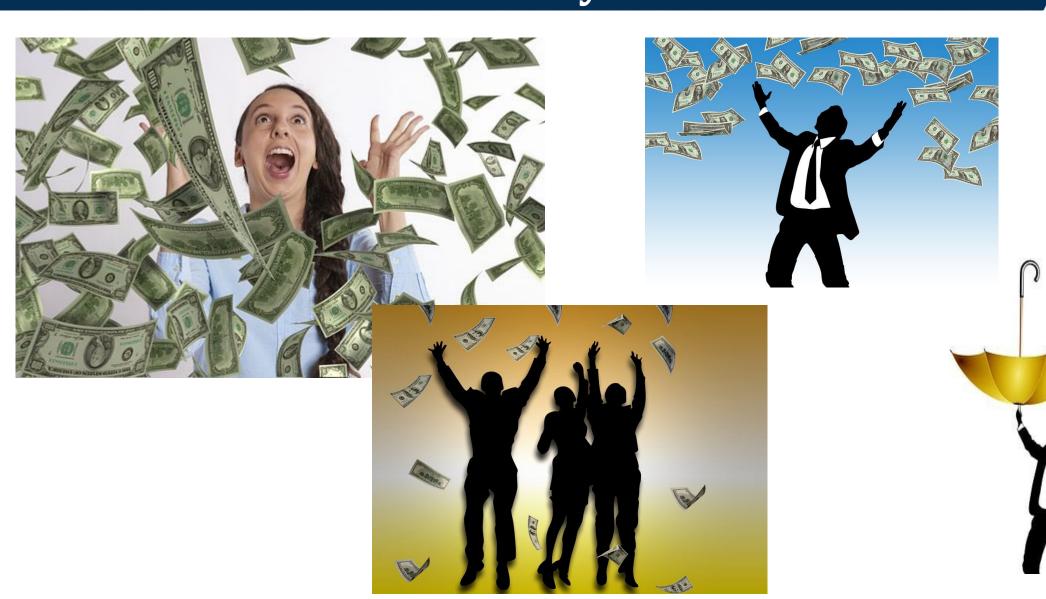

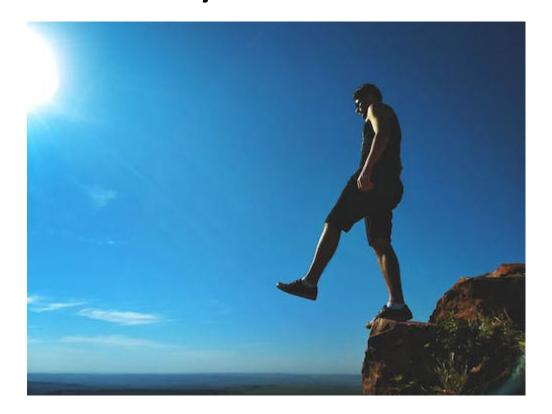

Why In-Depth Analysis is Necessary



Your Enrollment and Low-Income



The last 3 years, funding allocations for federal grants were based off of low-income and enrollment numbers from 2019-2020 school year.

Why? Because there was a National School Lunch Waiver that meant we didn't have an accurate means of capturing data for low-income data. We held LEA Round Table Discussions to explore using Direct Certification or other low-income measurements, but the old (FY2019-2020) free & reduced lunch data still proved most beneficial.

Low-Income Thresholds & Calculations



What does this all mean?

- The SDE will receive a snapshot in time in March 2023 from the Child Nutrition Dept. which we will apply to our *federally mandated allocation calculations* for your various grants.
- We will also be able to revert to using the current year's fall 2022 enrollment data!

Programs that use Economically Disadvantaged Data Collection as part of their allocation calculations



- Title I-A Improving Basic Programs is a federal program that helps students who are most at risk meet state academic standards and be proficient on state assessments.
- Title II-A Supporting Effective Instruction is a federal program to increase student achievement and improves teacher quality and effectiveness.
- IDEA Part B are federal grants designed to support LEAs pay excess costs
 of providing special education and related services to children with
 disabilities including that children with disabilities have access to a free
 appropriate public education (FAPE).

Effects of Updated Data



There will be winners and some losers...

Some LEAs have had major increases to enrollment that will contribute to higher allocations.



Other LEAs who may have benefited from the use of older enrollment numbers and low-income rates, may see their funding go down when we update to current data.

Low-Income Calculation Impact



According to the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), local educational agencies (LEAs) shall allocate Title I, Part A funds to eligible school attendance areas or eligible schools on the basis of the total number of students from low-income families (ESSA sections 1113[a][1] and [c][1]).

At least 35% of the students or the LEA income equivalent must be identified as low-income to be eligible for Title 1 school funding.

Census poverty estimates



- The ESEA requires that an LEA's eligibility and allocations under each Title I formula and its allocations for Title II be determined, in part, based on Census LEA poverty estimates.
- To derive a special (charter's) LEA's Census poverty estimate, an SEA needs alternative poverty data that are available for the special (charter)LEA for which Census data are not available. Idaho uses Child Nutrition Free & Reduced Lunch data (which is also used for determining the LEA home district).
- For any LEA that does not participate in the CNP, <u>low-income eligibility forms</u> must be completed.

Rank and Serve & the Grandfather Clause



Grandfather Clause:

• For one additional year only, section 1113(b)(1)(C) of the ESEA authorizes an LEA to allocate Title I funds to a school that is no longer eligible but was eligible and served in the preceding year.



 This provision applies to a newly ineligible school and not to an eligible school that has fallen in the poverty ranking compared to the previous year's ranking and does not receive a Title I allocation from its LEA because the LEA allocates its Title I funds to other eligible schools with higher poverty percentages.

Time for In-Depth Analysis



- What did my numbers look like in 2019-2020 for enrollment/low-income?
- What is my fall 2022 enrollment (SPED)? Title and other federal programming-what is my March 2023 count?
- What is my current district-level low-income rate?
- What are my building low-income rates? Are they below 35% or the LEA average?
- Have I already used the grandfather clause?



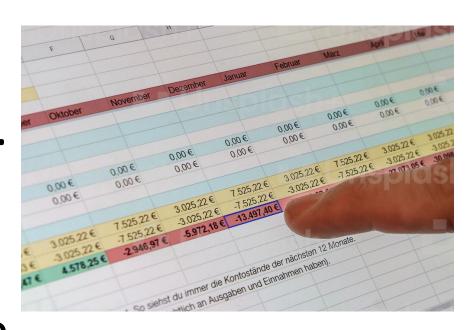
Best Practice for Analysis & Future Forecasts



- Calculate and recalculate!
- Run multiple funding scenarios.

Questions to ask:

- Will I have any carry-over?
- Can I blend and/or braid funds?
- What do my current staffing levels look like?
- What might my staffing needs look like next fall?

Prepping & Projecting for the New Budget



My Timeline to develop a budget

- Supplemental Levy ballot measure considerations
- July-August- finalize prior year audit, carryforward balances, receive final federal appropriations, JFAC summer meeting, interim legislative committees start work sessions
- September- reconcile payroll encumbrances to CY budget, any variance in student count versus your budget projection, assess any deployment of additional resources, state agency heads submit FY budget requests on September 1st

• October- PY audit is final, non-election year meet with our state

Planning for the New Budget



- November- mid-term support unit count calculated, I start to visit all schools/staff and present a State of the State financial address (which continues until the end of December), November 15th all departments (including the Superintendent) are given a Jan 15th deadline to submit FY budget request to me
- December- has the federal government managed to adopt a budget that is effective October 1st?, actual good numbers for Free and Reduced counts, monitor JFAC, attend ATI conference, monitor JFAC and other state interim committees for final reports, did Office of Performance Evaluations have a project related to K-12?
- January- CEC, EORAC, Governor's State of the State, LSO's budget book released first day of session, JFAC budget hearings and revenue projection. Our insurance committee meets with insurance broker. Target end of January for my state and federal FY Revenue projections, enrollment and F&R projections for FY, Jan 15th my departments start presenting their FY year budget requests, end of January I have projected options on additional costs for FY budget expenditures (inflation, operations, career ladder, strategic plan, one-time costs, policy changes), monitor legislature, lobby the legislature with a technocrat bent

From Budget Committee To Budget Adoption Feb-June



- February- convene our Small Budget Committee with mission of presenting a balanced budget to Superintendent by Spring Break, February 15th state foundation payment is received based on actual data, monitor legislature, JFAC may recommend K-12 agency budget at month end, lobby the legislature with a technocrat bent
- March- present to School Board overall financial projections and variables in play to balance FY budget, Small Budget Committee finishes its work, monitor legislature, lobby the legislature with a technocrat bent, Idaho session sine die
- April- Negotiations with teacher's union commence, health insurance committee finalizes work, draft budget presented to board, estimated federal appropriations are released, I provide a fair amount of content, explain the "why" augmented by financial details, RIF discussions start with principals & staff
- May- FY budget finalized with school board, teacher contract ratified. I provide a fair amount of content, explain the "why" augmented by financial details
- June- budget adoption mid-June

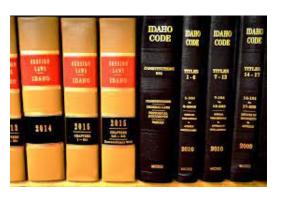

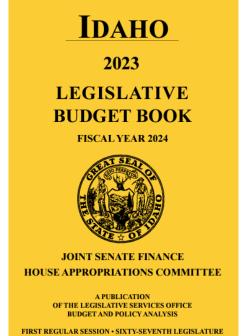
